"Every A.A. group ought to be fully self-supporting, declining outside contributions."

The decision to make AA a self-supporting organization must have been an agonizing one. Further funding from outside contributors would have provided resources for medical research and treatment of the disease, housing facilities providing food, clothing and shelter to every needy alcoholic and upscale meeting facilities more appealing to mainstream society. The quantity of people *introduced* to the program would have been much greater, but the quantity of *recovery* would have been undermined, if not destroyed. As difficult as declining outside contributions may be in the short term to the group and to the individual, it is essential to program success.

AA as an enterprise is clearly unique. It has no product to sell, no marketable services, no membership fees, and it delivers to the consumer without cost. What AA offers is entirely esoteric: the promise of a new, successful way of life. Recovery is offered by self-centered people helping one another. How could such an entity ever become a successful organization, with a recovery rate greater than anything science, psychology, institutionalization or medicine have to offer? How has AA been able to transform a single individual into the state of sobriety? It is an organization which has incorporated spirituality into all of its affairs, even into financing. It is recognition that, as unlikely as each of us is individually to succeed, we can work together and prosper beyond anyone's expectations.

Were AA to have accepted endowments, gifts and support from those who would have assisted us, there would have been no autonomy. Adding treatment facilities, hospices and nicer meeting places would have meant overhead and soliciting further donations to pay for added facilities and amenities, and compelled compromise to reconcile the inharmonious interests of contributors. 

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

"Leaving a Legacy of Love"

Big John was a volunteer here since 1985; this was way before I had gotten sober so I can only imagine how many lives this one man had touched over the phone. We can forget at times where we come from and lose our gratefulness for "just being sober", let alone all of the many written and unwritten gifts that we experience in sobriety. Big John never forgot to be grateful, humble and loving. If you ever had the opportunity to come to the office on Wednesday mornings at 9 AM you would have been invited to have one of Big John's "best in the world" cups of coffee. He made it a point to be here early so that when I got to work there was fresh pot of coffee. For a few years there was a doughnut ritual on Wednesday morning. So in his memory, for all of his service work both in and out of Central Office, for all who knew Big John, ate with Big John, enjoyed his friendship, we will always have a little more of all of the good things because he was here.

I loved Big John so much. He was truly a giant among men, physically, mentally and emotionally. The facts are that he remembered literally ALL of our names every time he saw us; that he NEVER said anything negative about anybody; that he never complained or told us of his pain; that he made us all feel like the most important person in the room when we were talking to him; that he always had time to listen to us; and MAINLY that the fact that he was the personification of the LOVE in our program! I will remember him always with gratitude, love and feel honored to have known him.

Big John was one of the few people who was older than me. He was considered part of the "great generation." He participated in two of the world's great events, as he was in World War II, both Pearl Harbor December 7, 1941 and the Normandy D-day invasion. Big John also had the best sense of humor. I am the temporary fill-in for Big John at Central Office and, although I don't think I can fill his shoes, I can dispose of the Wednesday morning donuts he and Es had together. His commitment to the program and the example he set was great to follow.

I met Big John in August 1984. At that time he was sober only two months. A giant of a man with the charm and charisma of a world leader or movie star, he gave me a giant Big John hug that night. He looked me eye ball to eye ball and said "Welcome home my little friend." We became close friends in and out of program and throughout the years I grew to respect, honor and love this man beyond words.

His stories of being a Pearl Harbor survivor, our monthly AA poker games and our sharing in thousands of meetings together, he always remained positive and encouraging and entertaining. He understood AA's Steps and Traditions and practiced them in all his affairs. He shared with me that AA meetings are for the sole purpose of delivering the message of hope to the alcoholic still suffering and not to air our daily sagas. He demonstrated this by never sharing in an AA meeting his personal daily issues; rather he shared the message of hope and love directed to the ones still suffering.

In private Big John shared many of his life issues with close AA friends but never whined or complained. He lived in the solution and not the problem. Big John told me a few months ago that he wanted to be remembered for living and dying a sober man. He did not want to be remembered as a hero or as anything special; he said that he was merely a man that came into AA close to death and as a result of his God, twelve steps and the Fellowship, he was able to grow up and become the man he had always hoped to become. He said that the key to his love and his blessed life was a direct result of his willingness to be of service in and out of AA. Big John was there to set up and clean-up a meeting place. He volunteered at central office and made hundreds of twelve step calls and he did all of this with grace and humility.

Big John's legacy is one of hope, love, service and humility. It is said that ultimately we will be judged not by our intentions but rather by our actions and Big John's actions and example is a legacy that will live in my heart and hearts of thousands of people forever.

Big John's presence will be missed but his message must be carried on and that is in our hands. Let's once again resolve to carry ourselves with dignity, honor, love, respect and humility while we trudge this happy road of destiny together as recovering Alcoholics, one step, one day, one moment at a time.



TRADITION SEVEN

"Every A.A. group ought to be fully self-supporting, declining outside contributions."

The phrase "self-supporting" seems to stand out in the wording of this most important of our twelve traditions. One of the more popular sayings amongst the southern hillbillies regarding their wives is "keep 'em barefoot and pregnant." Perhaps this could translate to our A.A. groups by saying, "Keep 'em broke and happy."

In the early days, keeping the groups broke was surely no problem. Most everybody on the program was one step ahead of the poor house and this reflected upon the financial status of the group. This didn't quench our habitual alcoholic thinking, however, so most of us thought that our collective problems could be solved by large amounts of money.

As the program developed, people and outside enterprises began to shower A.A. with contributions and donations. We were endowed with everything from hospitals to large amounts of cash from our would-be benefactors' wills. What to do with the money became a major cause of dissension and the ensuing havoc threatened to destroy A.A. It soon became apparent that the only safe way for us to operate was to decline ALL outside contributions and become fully self-supporting. Because of these

complications, most of the group treasurers carried a zero balance in their treasury.

But what about our expenses? Who pays rent and who buys the birthday cake and who pays for our supplies? The obvious answer is that we, THE GROUP, do. Every group strives to become fully

self-supporting by passing the basket at the end of the meeting. From these inside contributions, we must learn to make do and most of the time we find we have enough left over to make our donations to New York and our local Central Office. When sometimes the meeting grows small and our intake goes down, we have to tighten up our belts and do the best we can. Most meetings that go belly up are victims of personality conflicts and because the treasury is flat. Usually all the Secretary has to do is mention the fact that the rent can't be met or we can't buy coffee and every member kicks a little something extra into the basket.

When the Traditions were written, our Founders decided that bare running expenses plus a prudent reserve would be our financial policy. All outside contributions were refused and, in some cases, returned to the donor.

So it is clear that Tradition Seven will keep our program free from the internal strife that too much money from outside sources will bring. If we are to survive we must, as the Tradition says, decline outside contributions and concentrate upon becoming fully self-supporting.

Traditions Checklist

The questions on the Traditions Checklist were originally published in the Grapevine in conjunction with a series of articles on the Twelve Traditions that ran from November 1969 to September 1971. While they were originally intended as suggestions for individual use, many A.A. groups have since used them as a basis for wider discussion.

Tradition Seven: Every A.A. group ought to be fully self-supporting, declining outside contributions.

✓ Honestly now, do I do all I can to help A.A. (my group, my central office, my GSO) remain self-supporting? Could I put a little more into the basket on behalf of the new guy who can't afford it yet? How generous was I when tanked in a barroom?

- ✓ Should the Grapevine sell advertising space to book publishers and drug companies so it could make a big profit and become a bigger magazine, in full color, at a cheaper price per copy?
- ✓ If GSO runs short of funds some year, wouldn't it be okay to let the government subsidize A.A. groups in hospitals and prisons?
- ✓ Is it more important to get a big A.A. collection from a few people, or a smaller collection in which more members participate?
- ✓ Is a group treasurer's report unimportant
 A.A. business? How does the treasurer feel about it?
- ✓ How important in my recovery is the feeling of self-respect, rather than the feeling of being always under obligation for charity received?

She Who Must Be Kept...

y name is Marcia N., also known as "she who must be kept". My current sobriety date is September 27, 2006. I say "current" because there have been others.

I first came to Alcoholics Anonymous in 1989. I was sure this would be my one and only sobriety date, but I am what the Big Book calls "the defiant one". I had been running on self-will all my life and thinking I was doing a pretty good job! I was self sufficient, except for my mom. She owned the house I lived in, financed my car, and paid my credit card debt; but besides all that, I was on my own. Did I mention that I was "she who must be kept"? Well this required that I have a few "dude de jours". You know, so I could practice what I fondly called "dating for dinner". This loosely translated to: if I intended to eat dinner, I'd better find a date! Still young, that wasn't hard to do. You find a guy at the park, the liquor store or wherever. Smile that 'maybe you're going to get lucky' look and bingo, dinner, booze and some of whatever else he may have. Man, what a life!

Then the years passed quicker than I could follow. I wasn't so young any more. Being around another human being was just too much work! The dudes were no longer lining up at my door, the bank of "mom" had suspended my credit and I found myself deep in the disease of alcoholism and drug addiction. By now my mom no longer would pick me up after my 3 p.m. to 11 p.m. shift at St. Jude. It became increasingly harder to stay sober enough to get to work at 3 p.m. One New Year's Eve a coworker brought a bottle with him to work and, well that pretty much ended my medical career at St. Jude. Many other jobs at many other hospitals followed, always leaving before they fired me.

Then by a stroke of luck (or an act of God), I got my dream job working in veterinary medicine! This would certainly straighten out Marcia! Well not exactly. Did you know animals take many of the same drugs that I had become hopelessly addicted to? They do! Despite my dream job, I just couldn't keep my hands out of the cookie jar. As my addiction increased to the point of complete hopelessness, I prayed that perfect alcoholic prayer (did you know there is a perfect alcoholic prayer?). It went ...God, help me! I can not do this myself!" And for the first time, I asked for help as only the dying can, with all the faith I could muster. That was September 7, 1989. But wait, I told you my sobriety

date is September 27, 2006. Yes, there were many dates to follow... September 14, 1998 and even March 5, 2004.

I have made many mistakes in A.A. But the one thing I have come to know is that a "sin" is merely falling short of the mark and as mere humans we will often fail. Each time I fall, my God picks me up, dusts off my knees and sets me back on my path. I don't believe it matters how many times I fall. Only that when I do, I prav that perfect prayer, "God, I can't do this without your help!" You know, that has never failed me to this day!

I am no longer "she who must be kept". Today I pay my own way, I trust God to direct my thoughts, my words and my actions. And when I do, God graces me with the strength to fall short and try yet again. I have a husband who takes care of me; I don't sit on my laurels expecting him to do my job. Today we work as a team to obtain the kind of life I only dreamed of. I have a little job that pays my car payment, a little toward the mortgage and allows me to do lunch with the women in A.A. who have carried me from the woman I once was to become the woman I am today. It's a far cry from then and now!

If I could have dreamed a life sweeter than the one I have found in the rooms of A.A., I don't know what it would look like. My life today is filled with the love of the women who came before me and promise of those who will follow. And one day a woman will come in thinking she has no hope and I will be able to tell her that I was once like her. But today I have the hope of a better life and the promise that God will forgive me my weaknesses, brush off my skinned knees and set me back on my path. With a little hard work, maybe I can lower the bar of sobriety so that this time I may clear it.

A.A. Commitments: Why I take them (Why I keep them!)

kuh-mit-muh nt: a pledge, promise or obligation. Just three short syllables, yet the word *commitment* is capable of striking terror into the hearts of alcoholics. Why? Well, if you're like me, personal accountability is not second nature. During my drinking years I became an expert at making commitments, faking commitments, breaking commitments, and then blaming everybody else for my failure to fulfill them.

Whether it was showing up to work late or walking out of a troubled relationship, my alcoholic mind reasoned that, when I couldn't meet an obligation, it was always 'the other guy's fault': The woman in front of me on the freeway drove too slow. . . (TRUTH: I was too hung-over to get out of bed on time) . . . my alarm clock didn't go off (TRUTH: I was too drunk to set it before I passed out) . . . my husband spends more time at work than he does at home (TRUTH: Who wants to come home to a drunken nag of a wife?) All that blame led to resentments and, you guessed it - another reason to drink! Like I need one, right?

Alcoholics Anonymous has given me the solution I needed to end that destructive cycle. And part of that solution, as I learned early on, is to be accountable, or as they say in the rooms of A.A., to "suit up and show up." In these rooms I learned about taking and keeping commitments.

At first the commitments were very simple. My sponsor would ask me to read a page in the Big Book, to call her at a certain time, to show up at a meeting that night. That was all I could handle when I was a newcomer and it was OK. I always felt good after I did the things she asked.

As time went on, I took commitments at meetings: literature person, "chip chick," meeting secretary. I began to enjoy those commitments. It made me feel good to have a job to do and to

show up on time to do it. Having a commitment kept me actively involved in the meeting and allowed me get to know more people and them to know me. I began to feel the love and acceptance that I had been looking for (in all the wrong places) for so many years. Most importantly, commitments got me to the meetings every week so that I wouldn't miss the rest of the solution that A.A. and the fellowship so lovingly offered.

Today, six years later, I still have meeting commitments. I have also held commitments at central office and Intergroup, spoken on panels, volunteered at picnics and sober dances and been active in the Orange County A.A. Convention. I was even blessed to have had a very small commitment at the International A.A. Convention in Toronto at 4 years sober. What a life!.....and to think I may have missed the miracle had I not fulfilled those simplest of commitments I made in early sobriety: Read the book, call my sponsor, go to meetings.

I'd like to tell you that the only reason I take commitments is to carry the message to the alcoholic who still suffers. That's part of the reason, of course; but A.A. is a selfish program and I am just a selfish alcoholic at heart. The simple truth is, I take commitments for *me*! I take commitments because hanging out with all of you and working toward a common goal makes me feel a 'part of' – just like drinking did when I was 14 years old! It makes me feel good about me, about you and about Alcoholics Anonymous. And when something feels good, I crave more.

I've heard it said that there is a bolt for every nut in Alcoholics Anonymous. Commitments are the bolt that keeps a nut like me firmly fastened to the rooms and Fellowship of A.A.

have become a commercial organization dependent upon unreliable public popularity to meet rising financial obligations.

Mass production and commercialization of sobriety would have undermined the concept of one alcoholic helping another in working the steps, iron sharpening iron. In contrast to the computerized anonymity of today's world, a sponsor recognizes and supports the significance of a newcomer regardless of personal circumstances. The goal of AA is recovery, not mere exposure to the program and creature comfort of the participant. Group morale would be undermined by accommodating those who are not ready to place recovery as their first priority. We attract and keep the few who are truly driven, those willing to sacrifice their own wants and desires to selflessly serve others out of love and hope for one another, maintaining their own sobriety in the process.

The same autonomy is necessary for the individual. For example, I am currently self-employed. I came from a background of a monthly salary, a company car, expense account, and full health benefits. Every financial need was provided for. Alcoholic pride in feeling I could do a better job than others running a business, and a desire to rid myself of a micro-managing supervisor led to an abrupt parting of ways, without my researching plans for a business or saving for future operating costs. I did not have the knowledge to be self-sustaining on a personal level, let alone in running a business. My dilemma regarding financial concerns, I have discovered, is not uncommon among our members.

Faced with financial wreckage, we can avoid servitude to institutions such as creditors and lenders in the same way we learned to be free of the necessity of turning to alcohol to escape life's difficulties generally. There would be no personal growth or need to rely on a Higher Power if someone took over my program to be fiscally responsible by rescuing me from this predicament. The solution for my financial recovery is to take action and endeavor to be responsible. Every modest but satisfying success I have enjoyed in the past nine months of sobriety are found in the "process" of temporary resistance to change, the agony of temporary defeat, but the willingness to advance as directed, believing and seeing things work out one task at a time.

The harder I struggle for something, the more I value what I obtain, and it would appear that is true of AA as well. But for the growing pains of denying the easy way to attract and care for large numbers drawn to the group with recovery success, there would have been no reason to believe that alcoholics could prosper. We have demonstrated that alcoholics can develop worth and value; we are not always selfish, destructive and self-will run riot. There is great wisdom in adhering to spiritual principles on a group and individual basis in ALL of our affairs.
