Bill's Story

Second of 12 articles on Big Book highlights AA's beloved co-founder

Bill's Story, Chapter One in the Big Book, is another example of my extreme closed-mindedness upon entering Alcoholics Anonymous. Wasn't this just another example of the huge ego of one of the founding members of Alcoholics Anonymous? Why wasn't Bob's story given the same visibility? That tells you more about me than any of our founding members.

The truth is, when I sat down to read Bill's Story with another member of AA who was experienced in studying the book, it really didn't matter one bit that Bill's Story was the first chapter – what mattered is the experience Bill shares in his story. Another life lesson bearing out Henry Ford's maxim as quoted on page 124 of the Big Book, "*Experience is the thing of supreme value in life.*" When Bill's experience is examined as the life of a chronic alcoholic, many key ideas and principles emerge.



First, on the very first page, Bill discovers liquor when he "...*was part of life at last.*" Later, on the same page, "*I was very lonely and again turned to alcohol.*" To many of us, this has become too familiar – turning to alcohol to change the way we feel. If I feel bad, alcohol allows me to feel better. If I feel good, alcohol

allows me to feel even better. Until it just doesn't allow me to feel at all, any more.

Next, when Bill's drinking career is taken as a whole, we begin to see the downward spiral, which, like a roller coaster, never quite reaches the same heights, but the lows are lower each time – *"Over any considerable period we get worse, never better."* There are always moments where Bill thinks he has the solution, but there is always failure. Bill even does an absolutely perfect first step, and drinks again, (Page 8) *"No words can tell of the loneliness and despair I found in that bitter morass of self-pity.... I had met my match. I had been overwhelmed. Alcohol was my master. Trembling, I stepped from the hospital a broken man. Fear sobered me for a bit. Then came the insidious insanity of the first drink..."* Though he knows about the insanity of the first drink, he drinks again anyway. Until Ebby visits him and gives him the 2nd Step, he cannot come to believe that he can be restored to sanity through reliance on a higher power.

Every "line in the sand" is crossed or erased – at one point Bill looks with disgust at the people committing suicide on Black Friday by jumping from buildings, yet just two pages later he seriously contemplates the same escape more than once. He considers his "poor wife," yet steals from her "slender purse" to support his drinking. Again, this should be very familiar to most of the readers as the life of an alcoholic *"in his cups."*

When Ebby miraculously appears, (you'll need to read *Pass it On* to see just how miraculously) Bill is given the rest of the solution by another man with the same alcoholic experience as Bill. *No lectures to be endured, just a sincere desire to be helpful.* Bill is interested enough to listen with the open-mindedness that only the dying can have. He accepts the principles of a spiritual way of life laid out by Ebby, (see pages 13 and 14 where Ebby lays out the principles of his new way of life) because he realizes Ebby, a man who drank just like him, has accepted them and is free from alcohol.

On page 16, Bill sums up his experience and the experience of our society for more than 75 years. *"Most of us feel we need look no further for Utopia. We have*

Spirituality and Sobriety

Long-time AA member recounts struggles with bottle

The first time I got sober was in 1972 after 20 years of periodic alcoholic behavior that tore at my family life and nearly killed me. I grew up with an alcoholic wife-beating father and was conditioned to the drama that living the alcoholic life imposed.

After four years in the military, I went to work for a major corporation and luckily started fast-tracking my professional life. Doing well in my career and deluded by ego and false pride, I dismissed my domestic troubles as a case of bad breaks, or the fault of others. I knew God disapproved of my lifestyle, so ignoring thoughts of God stuff worked for me.

In 1972, I had two kids, the house with the swimming pool and two nice cars in the driveway. I never missed a day of work due to drinking, and my friends and associates did the same thing - no harm, no foul.

And then it happened. After a week of hard drinking and dalliances, my wife told me that unless I stopped drinking she and the children were gone.

My conscience was already tearing me apart, and suicide seemed the only way to end my shame. I told my wife to leave the house, I was either going

to commit suicide or call our pastor and seek help.

Our pastor came to the house and that day I became a Christian. Spending a lot of time in my Bible and relentless prayer for strength, the days and months of sobriety piled up.

One of our congregation members offered to take me to an AA meeting. I felt trapped; accept and show I am serious about my new lifestyle or refuse and suffer unspoken judgment. I accepted the invitation and went to a meeting.

That AA meeting was filled with smoke, low bottom drunks and old people over 50. (I'd put old as being over 50.) Not my kind of place. I was not anything like them, I just had a drinking problem. I never went to another meeting. God alone would have to keep me sober.

About a year later, I was in seminary to become a Presbyterian minister. Still, there was something missing and I felt restless and unworthy of the ministry. What I now know as character defects dogged my every step. I was living a lie, if not in actions, certainly in my head.

I knew I had to leave seminary before I did something stupid. If I finished and

got ordained, I knew the day would come when I would shame myself, family and the church. I left seminary at the end of that semester.

I convinced my family to move and start over, when my real motive was avoiding the shame I felt in disappointing the church members who had supported my efforts. We relocated out of state and I stayed sober for about two more years.

The day came when, feeling alienated from fellow workers for not drinking, my mind and false pride had me toying with the idea that, I can't be alcoholic because I had been without a drink for five years. I had proved drinking was just a control issue.

That night I had one gin and tonic, and by the end of the month I had been arrested for driving under the influence and found myself in jail. I was off and running for another nine painful years -- as if I had never stopped. I drank myself into such a state that I ended up drunk one morning in my sister's kitchen crying like a baby. I said, "I can't stop drinking and don't know what to do." Her reply was, "You are an alcoholic and everyone knows that except you. Our hospital has a rehab program and your insurance will pay for it." I went into rehab that day, still drunk.

How Critical is Sponsorship?

I have been around AA roughly 25 years. For 17 of those years I have been sober. I have had a sponsor for those 17 years. I believe there is a correlation.

Over the years, I have heard a lot of opinions from a lot of people on the subject of sponsorship. These opinions run the gamut – a sponsor should run your life, some say, while others believe you shouldn't have a sponsor at all. All I have is my experience. I was not able to sober up until I accepted some help.

My first sponsor was the first guy in a long time to show concern for me without looking down on me. I actually only had this man for a couple of weeks. His work schedule changed, and he set me up with another fellow. At the time I didn't understand, but he did me the greatest favor. He was a great guy – he cared enough about my new sobriety that he was willing to drop the "sponsor" tag and just be my friend. He has remained my friend to this day.

The second guy was a complete opposite from me. He was (and is) very organized and fairly successful. He would get me in his new car with his suit and tie on and take me to AA meetings four or five nights a week and tell me things like, "No matter what you've done, we will still love you." After a couple weeks of this, I told him a couple things I had done. To my surprise, he not only let me stay in the car, he shared a couple things he had done. Apparently, we're all basically the same, no matter how we look on the outside.

At about four or five years, my ego was up and I decided I needed my sponsor's sponsor to be my sponsor. It was the right move. The motive may have been a little shaky but I learned some things about myself. My new sponsor sponsored

a lot of guys, so the one-on-one attention I got from sponsor No. 2 was gone – he did remain available to me. I had to refer to the Big Book a lot more, and I had to learn to get right to the point when I did have a question or concern. I don't want to make this sponsor sound like he was harsh; he was usually upbeat and stressed compassion for the new man.

There came a time to split with the group in which I got sober and that meant a new sponsor (we have neither the time or space to get into that). There is a God. I have never been a big supporter of AA'S working as drug and alcohol counselors. I am in meetings and I'm listening to people share. I ask this "old timer" for his phone number just to have someone to talk to and he appoints himself my sponsor. He was not what I wanted but he was exactly what I needed. I was struggling with some things that were occurring in my personal life.

We spent a year looking at step 3. I didn't know that's what he was doing but at the end of it, things started to get better and I am okay with AA's working as counselors.

Which brings us to today. I have a wife, a daughter, a job, family and a good amount of AA commitments. My sponsor today has experience with all these things and I go to him with the situations he has already experienced. When I asked this guy to be my sponsor, he told me "no." he then explained he doesn't want to end up as a guru. He said he would be my friend. When I told him that I have a handful of guys watching me who need the accountability of having a sponsor, he told me I could call him my sponsor if anyone asks. So when I am doubtful about something, I ask his opinion. Although he rarely tells me what to do, he asks questions and I usually come up with an answer that I had all along.

Here is my opinion -- get a sponsor. If nothing else, they will help you navigate the AA landscape. They should be able to tell you when to stand up and when to sit down. A relationship with a sponsor is not a marriage; it is a tool to help us stay sober and sane.

beaten, helpless as a child and morally and spiritually bankrupt. With the help of AA and a restored spiritual commitment, the process of recovery began. AA led me to deal with character defects of alcoholic thinking that were not appropriate subjects for church prayer groups, hence ignored the first time I got sober. My faith coupled with the steps of AA strengthened my in-

ner self like never before. It took that hopeless state of surrender to begin rebuilding a new man on a spiritual and ethical foundation.

To deny that humans require spiritual fitness as well as moral, mental and physical fitness, seems insane today. I cannot imagine an alcoholic recovering without a higher power and the steps of AA. In my experience, you cannot be both spiritually fit and an alcoholic.

Nor can I hardly believe I have 24 years clean and sober.

It was, and is, the shared link between AA and my faith that restored me from a seemingly hopeless state of mind and body.

Charlie P., who Launched Big Book Workshops With Joe McQ., Dies at 82

Charlie P., 82, who in the late 1970s teamed up with another recovering alcoholic, Joe McQ., to deliver the "Joe and Charlie Big Book Workshops," died on April 21 in Maysville, AR.

Joe and Charlie met in 1973 when Joe introduced Charlie as the AA speaker at an Al-Anon Convention. Joe had wondered if Charlie might be the country-western singer Charlie Pride. "He wasn't even the right color," Joe laments. They instantly discovered their mutual fascination with AA's basic text, "The Big Book." What interested them most was that The Big Book was written in a particular sequence to convey certain ideas.

Soon they were planning meetings at AA conventions in Oklahoma and Arkansas. In 1977, some members met in a Tulsa, OK hotel room for a discus-

sion of the Big Book. One asked Joe & Charlie to come to his home group to present a program on the book. An AA taper made a four tape set of their presentation and called it "The Big Book Study". The tapes were gradually circulated throughout the fellowship and invitations were received for Joe & Charlie to present the study at AA conventions, roundups and special events.

At the 1980 International AA Convention in New Orleans, Westly P. an impassioned Big Book reader from Pompano Beach, Florida, organized a lunch for 1,500 AAs from all over the world and gave away 100 Joe & Charlie tape sets as door prizes. Invitations exploded and within a couple of years, Joe & Charlie were presenting about 36 studies a year worldwide.

The seminars have been presented in 48 states and Canada. Additionally, Australia, New Zealand, England, Scotland, Ireland, Germany, Switzerland, Sweden and the Netherlands have all hosted the Big Book Study seminars with Joe & Charlie.

Joe McQ. died in 2007.

Some fellow AAs have termed the duo, "self-appointed gurus". Others have accused them of making money on these weekends. Actually, only travel expenses, meals and lodging are paid for by the independent AA host committee sponsoring the study. Since 1977, an estimated 200,000 AA Members have experienced the spiritual benefits of these collective studies (as of 2007).

Charlie was a friend of Bill W. 's for 41 years.

CHARMING IS THE WORD FOR ALCOHOLICS

Down at the very bottom of the social scale of AA society are the pariahs, the untouchables, and the outcasts, all known by one excoriating epithet-relatives.

I am a relative. I know my place. I am not complaining. But I hope no one minds if I venture the plaintive confession that there are times, oh, many, many, times when I wish I had been an alcoholic. By that I mean that I wish I were an AA. The reason is that I consider the AA people the most charming in the world.

Such is my considered opinion. As a journalist it has been my fortune to meet many of the people who are considered charming. I number among my friends stars, and lesser lights of stage and cinema; writers are my daily diet.

I know the ladies and gentleman of both political parties; I have been entertained in the White House. I have broken bread with kings and ministers and ambassadors and I say after that catalog, which could be extended, that I would prefer an evening with my AA friends to any

person or group of persons I have indicated.

I ask myself why I consider so charming these alcoholic caterpillars who have found their butterfly wings in Alcoholics Anonymous. There are more reasons than one, but I can name a few.

They are imaginative, and that helps to make them alcoholics. Some of them drank to flog their ambition on to greater efforts. Others guzzled only to black out unendurable demons that rose in their imagination. But when they have found their restoration, their imagination is responsive to new incantations, and their talk abounds with color and light, and that makes them charming companions too.

The AA people are what they are, and they were what they were, because they are sensitive, imaginative, possessed of a sense of humor and awareness of universal truth. They are sensitive, which means they are hurt easily, and that helped them to become alcoholics.

But when they have found their restoration, they are still as sensitive as ever; responsive to beauty and to truth and eager about the intangible glories of this life. That makes them charming companions.

They are possessed with a sense of humor. Even in their cups they have been known to say damnable funny things. Often it was being forced to take seriously the little and mean things of life that make them seek escape in a bottle. But when they have found restoration, their sense of humor finds a blessed freedom, and they are able to reach a godlike state where they can laugh at themselves, the very height of self conquest.

Go to the meetings and listen to the laughter. At what are they laughing? At ghoulish memories over which weaker souls would cringe in useless remorse. And that makes them wonderful people to be with by candlelight.

And they are possessed of a sense of universal truth. That is often a new thing in their hearts. The fact that this at-one-meant with God's universe had never been awakened in them is sometimes the reason why they drank. The fact that it was at last awakened is almost always the reason why they were restored to the good and simple ways of life.

Stand with them when the meeting is over, and listen while they say the "Our Father." They have found a power greater than themselves which they diligently serve. And that gives them a charm that never was elsewhere on land or sea. It makes you know that God, Himself, is really charming, because the AA people reflect His mercy and His forgiveness.

Think twice before taking that first drink! Then call your sponsor or another sober member of AA instead.
