Rockin Soberfest Error Stirs Controversy

A controversy over Rockin Soberfest's organizers' failure to contribute to North Orange County Central Office this year – after 20 years of faithfully doing so — erupted in July at the monthly Intergroup meeting.

NOC Central Office has received more than \$50,000 in donations from organizers of the annual event over the years. But when an anticipated \$4,000 contribution from this year's soberfest was not received, Intergroup members wanted to know why.

Many questioned why the event is promoted as a fundraiser for NOC Central Office when they were being left in dark about the whereabouts of the 2013 contribution.

The issue was first raised at the July meeting by representatives who que-

ried Intergroup board chairman Paul P. as to the whereabouts of this year's donation. The Soberfest, held every February, is not organized by NOC Central Office, the chairman told them. Then why is the event promoted as a "Fundraiser for Central Office," several Intergroup members asked.

Questioned further, and after contentious debate, Paul agreed to look into the matter further.

The main organizer, Glenn H., who has spearheaded the event for its entire 20-plus year history, issued a letter that was read at the August Intergroup meeting. In it he stated that his bank accounts, including the one with the Soberfest proceeds, were seized by the state board of equalization following a failed business venture. He pledged in the letter to make good

on the donation and promised better accountability in the future.

One person close to the event said that Glenn H. has been the "heavy lifter" in making the Rockin Soberfest a reality every year and that the event has generated more than \$65,000 in donations to central office. He acknowledged that Glenn made a mistake this year and that steps are being taken to ensure such errors don't occur again.

A committee of about 20 people oversee the organization of the Soberfest, which counts on numerous other volunteers to ensure its success.

The Rockin Soberfest has been a mainstay for the North Orange County Alcoholics Anonymous community and typically features a dinner, speaker meeting, music and dance. It is held at the Union Hall in Stanton.

Tradition One

First of a continuing series on the 12 traditions

Long Form: Each member of Alcoholics Anonymous is but a small part of a great whole. AA must continue to live or most of use will surely die. Hence our common welfare comes first. But individual welfare follows close afterward.

Short Form: Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends upon AA unity.

The left side of the equilateral triangle that lists our Three Legacies in Alcoholics Anonymous, (Recovery, Unity and Service) is Unity - and the 12 Traditions is the basis for this legacy. An equilateral triangle is defined as having three equal sides. When speaking about AA's Three Legacies, equal is the key word in that statement. None is more important than the other. Of course, if we don't have the 1st one, Recovery, none of the rest matter. I believe that it is equally true of the 2nd and 3rd Legacies, Unity and Service. If we don't have these, in addition to Recovery, the whole thing will collapse.

Tradition One is the statement of purpose for the 12 Traditions – as a society, our goal is the continued common welfare of Alcoholics Anonymous, for without Alcoholics Anonymous, most of us would surely die. In an article in the April 1946 AA Grapevine titled, "Twelve Suggested Points of AA Tradition", Bill W stated the following, "Since personal calamity holds us in bondage no more, our most challenging concern has become the future of Alcoholics Anonymous; how to preserve among us AAs such a powerful unity that neither weakness of persons nor the strain and strife of these troubled times can harm our common cause. We know that Alcoholics Anonymous must continue to live. Else, save few exceptions, we and our fellow alcoholics throughout the world will surely resume the hopeless journey to oblivion".

An AA member who served as a lightening rod for the discussion of AA's Twelve Traditions, Ken '45, once told me that each Tradition, excepting Tradition 12, asks me to surrender something for the common welfare of AA. Sort of "addition by subtraction". How true that has proven to be. Tradition One, tells me that any idea that I might be more important than anybody else in AA was simply self-centeredness on my part. That's

an easy one to see, but also an easy one to lose track of. And how do I know when I might possibly be thinking that I'm more important than someone else in AA — usually it is because I am feeling a little warm in the face and my ears, and I can feel my blood pressure rising and pounding in my ears and — I am angry! Someone has deviated from their rightful place — that of being in total agreement with me!

The next lesson I learned about Unity — it doesn't necessarily mean agreement. In AA, I have come to understand that, (NO!) I am often wrong, or at the very least, out of step with the Group. This Tradition serves to remind me that for all those times I have held the Group in thrall with my tearful expressions of gratitude for AA, there comes a time when I must actually practice that gratitude with my actions — doing what is best for the Group and AA as a whole.

Four Years Sober and Now Happy

Four years ago I entered a Chemical Dependency Recovery Program desperately seeking help with an alcohol problem I couldn't seem to fix on my own. After 25-plus years of heavy drinking, I had finally reached a point where I couldn't stand it anymore.

I had many health problems including high blood pressure, chronic acid reflux, peripheral neuropathy, and painful gout attacks where I could hardly walk. I was feeling miserable in my job, my marriage, and my life. I drank to relieve anxiety, depression, and feelings of inadequacy, but the drinking didn't seem to work like it used to. It was now making things worse.

I wouldn't believe I was an alcoholic. That word scared me! I was functioning well, I thought - never lost a job because of my drinking, had no DUIs, and no one was forcing me to get into treatment. But most mornings I would struggle not to puke as I tried to brush my teeth. I couldn't get to sleep without drinking.

I regularly would awaken at 3 AM, wide awake and anxious, then would down four more shots so I could get more sleep before going to work. For a long time I didn't connect my shaky hands at work with my drinking. My job required precise hand-work often while others watched me. I learned to find ways to compensate for my shaky hands or avoid working under supervision. I routinely suffered through hangover symptoms at work, but managed to hide my problem from most people for a long time.

My life had turned into a repeating cycle of struggling through morning hangovers, anxiety and cravings for a drink building throughout the afternoon, and rushing home to get those first couple double-whiskeys starting my evening of drinking. The amount I drank was progressing. I had held pretty steady for years at about 10 to 12 drinks per day, but then it was a fifth of whiskey, then often a liter, and much more when I was feeling particularly stressed. Most people except my wife didn't know how much I drank. I drank mostly at home in seclusion.

GSO Opposes Efforts to Memorialize Bill W. with Postage Stamp

Warm Greetings from G.S.O.!

We have recently been made aware of an effort made by several non-A.A. organizations who have petitioned the U.S. Postal Service to develop a Bill Wilson commemorative stamp (a photo of Bill). The copy of their petition that was forwarded to us also suggested that if such a stamp is created, it would be "unveiled during the 2015 International Convention of Alcoholics Anonymous in Atlanta, GA (July 2-5, 2015)."

We are writing to let you know that the General Service Board of Alcoholics Anonymous and the General Service Office, which coordinate the International Convention, have not been contacted directly regarding this. Furthermore, there are no such plans in place, nor will there be, to include this as part of our upcoming convention.

A letter to the appropriate department at the U.S. Postal Service has been dispatched, explaining our principle of anonymity, and clarifying that this effort is not endorsed or supported by Alcoholics Anonymous.

As you all know, our organization cherishes the principle of personal anonymity of our members, both living and deceased. Our founders believed, as Bill said in a letter to a newspaper editor in 1950, that "personal success in the A.A. program requires humility, that we have no right to claim distinction for the gift of sobriety."

Bill W. wrote that before Dr. Bob died, they both firmly agreed that neither one of them would accept public honors for A.A. work. Bill felt that "such an example, set before future generations of power-driving A.A. members, might prove to be worth more than any prestige which such honors could confer upon either of us. This was our estimate, and I still believe it to be the right one." (Letter, February 1960)

failed at attempts to drink moderately. My attempts to abstain on my own were short-lived and as a "dry drunk" with much anticipation for the day I could drink again.

When I got into treatment I met people with long-term sobriety who were enjoying their lives and I found hope that it could work for me too. I began to build a personal recovery program unique to me. Despite initial reservations about AA, I began to try different groups and eventually found AA a valuable addition to my program. I followed the idea in the phrase "Take what you can use and leave the rest." I got a sponsor and worked through the 12 steps.

A big challenge for me was sharing in

groups in spite of social anxiety and low self-esteem. I was very uncomfortable and often hardly said a word, but I kept going back and made persistent attempts at sharing more and more. I learned to be more open and honest and to let people see more of the person I kept so private.

A major benefit of my recovery is a happier marriage. Over the years my wife and I had grown apart and argued frequently. I've worked at understanding her more, to practice more acceptance, to communicate better, and to apologize quicker. We are finding things we like to do together again. We will celebrate our 32-year anniversary this year and are enjoying being retired together.

When I gave up alcohol it was important to fill the void with other things. One important thing has been service work. I began volunteering at the Senior Center, Big Brothers Big Sisters, and the local community garden.

I reached out to fellow alcoholics. This was counter to my tendency for isolation and feelings of shyness, but has brought much pleasure and meaning to my life.

Today I greet most mornings with joy and much gratitude. My life is immensely better now and I look forward to many more sober days.
